News from the Clerk

Property Covenants – changes to property and planning applications

A number of retrospective applications are being made to the parish council for works on properties on Fairford Leys. The applications are a result of the sellers and purchasers solicitors requesting evidence of permission for such works under The Ernest Cook Trust Covenants which the parish council manage. Can we please remind residents that failure to seek permission could cause problems with the sale of your property. Retrospective permission will not be granted if the parish council have objected to your proposed works or do not agree with alterations already made even though planning permission is not required.

The ECT Covenant Permission must still be sought separately even though you have received Planning Permission or Build Regulations Permission. AVDC clearly point this out on their documentation to residents when giving planning permission.

Garage conversions are also subject to Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) planning regulations and you need to obtain both planning permission from AVDC and "Covenant Permission" from Coldharbour Parish Council, because of the loss of vehicle parking space. These are two very separate permissions.

Changing your front door

We are constantly contacted for advice on

front changing doors. Please note that changing the front door of your property will require ECT Covenant Permission. There are a number of designs on Fairford Levs and these are all acceptable under the Master Plan for Fairford Levs. You can replace like for like and many



residents have done this. However, you must use one of the colours which form part of the design. These are dark blue, black, dark green, red, and white

Coldharbou

Some residents have installed completely new, modern designed, doors which are not part of the overall design for the properties. The parish council may not grant ECT Covenant Permission if this is retrospectively applied for should you be in the process of selling your property

HS2 – The impact on Fairford Leys

The parish council has continued to campaign strongly against HS2 and has paid towards its own Parliamentary Agent to represent our objections to HS2 as well as point out, and fight for, mitigation to the



level of impact on Fairford Leys. We are especially concerned about increase in traffic, noise and visibility impact.

Coldharbour Parish is very concerned about traffic impacts across the village. In particular we fear that the spine road (Coldharbour Way), if not used by construction traffic, will be used by rat-running drivers avoiding queues on Oxford Road or Bicester Road. St Marys School is located off Coldharbour Way and there are understandable concerns about pupil safety at the village school, especially as many families walk or cycle to or from this important local facility. The council believes that as a minimum the Promoter (HS2) should place restrictions on construction traffic to avoid peak time operations and should do all it can to manage and minimise vehicle rat-running through the estate.

Whilst it appears that HS2 Ltd has given an assurance that the playing fields will not be affected by either the construction or operation of the railway, and that the

existing western edge of the village will also be protected, ensuring that the wooded path will remain as a local amenity, the promoter has offered little in the way of visual and noise mitigation for those who live on the north western edge of the village. At this point the line of route will be clearly visible to residents as it emerges from the 'embankments' and heads towards the Thame Valley viaduct, a feature which appears to benefit from very little, if any, visual or noise mitigation. This must be remedied. The parish council is also keen to ensure that the same level of protection is afforded to Coldharbour and its permanent residents, as is proposed for Hartwell House Hotel with its temporary residents.

Rats and other vermin

It is becoming a real concern to many about the amount of food and scraps being left on the riverine areas for wild animals. Whilst it is nice to feed the birds and other wildlife it is causing a serious problem. The food is attracting rats and other vermin and we request, very strongly, that residents stop putting food and scraps out for the animals along the riverine corridor area.

Double Yellow Lines outside the shops

Please do not park on the double yellow lines outside the shops - even to "just to pop in for a paper". They are there for the convenience and safety of all and enforcement is being requested by the parish council for the continuing problems of parking on double yellow lines in the main village square and other areas. We are pushing for zero tolerance as people are causing problems for other road users and pedestrians.

Fairford Leys Public Access Community Defibrillator

We are pleased to announce the installation

of a defibrillator which is attached to the wall of the Fairford Leys Centre, under the colonnade. See details on page 4. Whilst we hope that no one has to use this



device, we also hope that if they do have to, it will save someone's life.

New Benches across Fairford Leys

In the last edition of Coldharbour News, we told you that the parish council is considering a request to provide benches across the village and we asked for suggestions as to where you would like them to be installed. Suggestions will be considered at the next council meeting along with a very kind offer from one resident who has offered to pay for one. Watch this space for further details.

Grounds Maintenance Update

Christmas in the square seems like months ago, but I hope that all the residents who attended enjoyed the evening. I particularly hope you liked the lights which myself and the team put up in the square and the very large Christmas tree which is kindly donated every year by the Ernest Cook Trust to brighten up the village centre on those dark winter evenings. The council hope to provide even more lights this year.

The winter bedding was put in at the end of 2015 and the bulbs are now starting to show themselves ready for the spring. Please can I ask people not to pick them so that they can be enjoyed by everyone in the village.



The council has ordered a large amount of road salt and my team have been busy filling the salt bins around the village. Please note that the salt in the bins is for use by the maintenance team plus residents who need to salt the roads and not for use on private driveways. We only have a limited supply, so please use responsibly. You may have also noticed that the council has also purchased a small road gritting machine that tows behind our vehicle so that the team can be ready for most weather conditions and keep the busses running.

We have also started to do some park maintenance which is ongoing. If you see anything that concerns you please do ring the centre on 01296 422800 so that one of the council staff can address this quickly.

The rain has made the riverine swell and overflow in places and we will start the litter clear up as soon as it is safe to do so.

January is always seen as a dark dull month, so I hope that all the efforts my team have made will be appreciated and that the spring bulbs popping up around the village will give residents a little bit of pleasure when they walk around.

Public Access Defibrillator

As some of you may have noticed the parish council has installed a large green container outside the Fairford Leys Centre. This briefcase sized box contains a Public Access Defibrillator, or PAD for short, which is a machine designed to assist in the treatment of someone in cardiac arrest.

It's name sounds quite scary and dealing with someone having a heart attack is obviously a very worrying experience but all experts agree that the quicker the treatment for someone in this situation, the better the outcome. In fact for every minute without CPR and defibrillation the chances of survival are reduced by 10%.

The British Heart Foundation has worked hard to raise awareness of CPR (who can forget Vinnie Jones and the Staying Alive advert) and many of us have basic first aid training, yet because, fortunately, we do not come across heart attack victims very often many will be unsure of their skills in a panic situation.

This is where a PAD system comes into its own. The machine is accessed via a code obtained from the emergency services (999 or 112) and once switched on gives clear spoken instructions as to what to do. The machine will also detect the heart's rhythm and deliver a shock if one is required and can treat both adults and children.

These machines do not take the place of CPR but work alongside it and obviously dialling 999 or 112 should always be the first thing that anyone does



if they find someone collapsed but they do provide a safe extra level of treatment until an ambulance arrives.

I hope the PAD will never be needed but am pleased we now have one just in case.

Fairford Leys 'Community' Centre News



In modern times it is easy sometimes to forget what a 'community' is. In respect of Fairford Leys I would suggest the best definition is 'a group of people who live in the same area'. Perhaps more important is another word which I think applies to Fairford Leys alongside community and that is 'spirit' which could be defined as 'the enthusiasm and loyalty that somebody feels through belonging to a group'.

On Fairford Leys we are fortunate to have a village centre which lends itself to community events and a parish council prepared to organise these events, Music in the Square (June 18th), Fair in the Square (July 9th) to name but two.

I feel fortunate at the centre to be able to meet and talk to many residents of Fairford Leys, but equally I often speak to people who do not live in the village but may be hoping to, or come here specifically

to use the shops, doctors, dentist, pharmacy or vets that are on our doorstep. Universally people are impressed with how Fairford Leys has developed and the services we have available.

Among the groups who use the centre, on Monday mornings we have a group who meet up at the centre at 10.30 and then go for a walk around the village, by the riverine or using many of the purpose-built footpaths before returning to the centre for a cup of tea or coffee and a chat. The group only started around the middle of 2015 but is now regularly attended by between 20 and 30 people a number which I believe puts it alongside many other such groups which have been longer established.

Recently the centre has been hired by two charities for Quiz Nights. One was Cruse who provide bereavement counselling and the other was the Karibuni Trust who help children from the streets and slums of Kenya. I am pleased to say that both evenings were a success with around 100 people attending each and both charities made in the region of £900 for their particular cause.

Below, you will find a timetable showing the wide range of activities available here, ranging from WI to Exercise classes, from Slimming World/WeightWatchers to adult and childrens Martial Arts and Karate. On Friday afternoons we have a friendship club. A group of over 55s who meet to socialise have a cup of tea and a cake and play board games. For further details please call the centre on 01296 422800.

I beieve we really do have something for pretty much anyone in the community, so next time you are picking up your Indian/Chinese/ fish and Chips or using one of the local shops why not take the time to look in at the centre and see what it might be able to offer you.

Neighbourhood Watch in Fairford Leys

I am the Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator for the village and I provide an interface between Fairford Leys Neighbourhood Watch groups and Thames Valley Police.



People often ask me what Neighbourhood Watch involves.

Initially the setup for each scheme is very easy:

1. A kind volunteer decides to be a co-ordinator for their street.

- **2.** They contact me with details which I forward to Diane Brown of Thames Valley Police requesting a coordinator's pack.
- **3.** The new coordinator visits neighbours and gathers contact details from those who wish to sign up.
- **4.** lanning permission requests for signs on lamp posts are sent to Diane for approval and put in place. I also encourage members to display signs in windows. (Small removable decals).
- **5.** The new coordinators receive notifications from TVP Alerts via e-mail and share with their group and that's all there is to it!

A basic criminal records check is required. Diane will give details to volunteers.

What are the benefits?

- Getting to know your neighbours and strengthening community ties.
- Possible discount on home insurance.
- High quality advice and information on home security.
- Supporting vulnerable neighbours.
- Enhanced feeling of security.

Do you have a twin?

I wonder what was your most unusual, or most unexpected, Christmas present? As the years go on, and as our family circles get wider, it seems to get harder and harder to find original, useful and meaningful presents. I think this has led to the rise in popularity of the charity catalogues, where you receive a card notifying you of a goat, bicycle, mosquito net, etc. that has been sent on your behalf to a needy family.

We received something along those lines - a toilet. Not the physical item, but a framed certificate telling us of a latrine that has been provided for a community in Pakistan, about 80 km east of Hyderabad. I first came across this scheme many years ago; since then the organisation has merged with various partners, and in the current form they are celebrating their 5th year. They are suggesting that supporters hold a birthday party in celebration, so the church will be doing just that. A time to officially recognise our twinned toilet status, and promote the idea to others in the community. Come along on Saturday 12th March at 5pm for plenty of toilet-related humour!



Water is used as a powerful symbol in many places in the Bible: God bringing order to the chaotic waters at creation; the cleansing water of Baptism; the life-giving water given by Jesus to a thirsty woman. Clean water and sanitation is something that we take for granted, but it is an area where a small amount of help can make such a difference to the lives and prospects of whole communities in less fortunate situations.

This project will work well alongside our regular appeal for funds to support the work of Water Aid. Toilet twinning is a

single fixed donation that can happen at any time; during Lent we ask members of the congregation to collect their loose change, and fill our large collecting bucket in the weeks leading up to Easter. Last year we reached our target figure of £500.

Brain injury charity steps into New Year with Lottery cash boost

The local brain injury charity Headway Aylesbury Vale recently won approximately £10,000 from the Big Lottery Fund to run photographic sessions. This will be of huge benefit to the survivors of Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) because it will give them skills and experience to aid in rebuilding confidence for reintegration into mainstream society.

Headway's trustees also hope the classes will widen their appeal among 18 to 30 year-olds, the main cohort of Aylesbury Vale's estimated 1,500 survivors of ABI – a condition which can be caused by illness or an accident. However, they stressed that the lottery cash is strictly ring-fenced for the classes and workshops and that they still urgently need funds to help run their services at their base in Fairford Leys.

Phil Simmons, Chairman of the Trustees added: "Despite the progress we have made this year, we do need further help from volunteers to either assist with services or help fundraise for us, because we are in constant need of funds to continue the

Vaccinations – Did you know?.....

Dogs, cats and rabbits are susceptible to several common and potentially fatal infections that can be avoided by vaccination. The sources of these diseases include other diseased animals, healthy "carrier" animals and contaminated environments. Vaccination provides and efficient solution to the prevention of diseases that may be acquired from known or unsuspected sources.

Vaccinations make susceptible animals immune and resistant to infectious disease. However, it is doubtful whether any vaccination provides a level of immunity that totally prevents infection following natural exposure. In the vaccinated animal, contact with the infectious agent produces a boost to vaccination-induced immunity resulting in a more effective containment of infection. Although an infection may not be completely prevented, the quantity of infectious agent in vaccinated animals may be much reduced after exposure leading to protection from clinical disease. In addition to preventing disease in individual animals, if enough of the population is protected from infection the agent may be eradicated as it cannot spread in the community (e.g. distemper virus in dogs).

Animals are born with antibodies from their mothers; hence vaccinations are usually started when they are 8 to 10 weeks old to coincide with the reduction in these antibodies. Vaccinations are usually modified live (weakened) or non-living. The latter includes components of organisms, inactivated or genetically-

engineered components, chemically-inactivated virus and recombinant proteins.

Cat vaccinations include Feline Calicivirus, Feline Herpesvirus (cat 'flu'), Feline Parviovirus and Feline Leukemia Virus. Dog vaccinations include Canine Distemper Virus, Canine Parvovirus, Canine Adenovirus, Leptospirosis, Canine Parainfuenza and Bordatella Bronchiseptica (Kennel Cough). Rabbits are vaccinated against Myxomatosis and Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus.

Most vaccines for dogs and cats contain living organisms which produces a better quality and quantity of immune response than non-living vaccinations. Vaccine manufacturers often recommend that booster doses of vaccines should be given following a primary course. In most cases this advice is based on their duration of immunity studies. Recently, based on persistence of antibody levels following vaccination, it has been suggested that dogs do not require vaccination annually to all canine viruses and a period of 3 years between some components of dog vaccinations has now been adopted. For example here at Hampdens we vaccinate dogs annually for Leptospirosis and Kennel Cough and every 3 years add in the Distemper, Adenovirus and Parvovirus.

Going Green

Too good to be true!

Climate change, although important and affecting us all, seems to be a subject that is avoided. Many believe that it does not affect them, but we can all do our bit to reduce the forthcoming effects, whilst gaining commercially now.

much brighter area, no maintenance costs or headaches and lower electricity bills. It's too good to be true, and seeing is believing.

At least the Fairford Leys Centre has now become much more energy efficient and 'greener', Andrew Barnett Centre Manager said "We have taken the initiative to meet the forth coming climate change responsibility seriously and playing our part in reducing operating costs, whilst saving money long term".

Legal Answers to Family Problems

Our third article from Kidd Rapinet We hope you have found them useful.

Leaving on a jet plane?



Two years ago my girlfriend and I split up. Our son

now lives with his Mum and I see him frequently including every other weekend. My ex recently married her boyfriend who is from Australia. We were getting on well, in fact I attended their wedding. However, he has now been offered a full time job back in Australia and is keen to return. My ex says it is a chance of a lifetime for her and our son. I am worried that I might never see my son again, what should I do?

Mark Studdart says: A very difficult decision awaits you and your ex-partner. You share something called Parental Responsibility for your son. This means that you must make decisions together about your son's welfare including whether it is best for him to live with his mother outside of the UK.

If you cannot reach agreement ultimately the Family Court can make a decision for you, called a Child Arrangements Order. Such decisions are based primarily on your son's best interests but the Court will look hard at the implications on when your son can spend time with you as well as practical matters such as the plans for where he would live, where he would go to school, how secure the new husband's job is and other related matters. It is sensible to have a frank discussion with your ex-partner and to request full details of her practical plans. If you remain unhappy then you must seek advice from a qualified lawyer who specialises in family law work.
