Riverine Corridor Land Transfer

We are now at the stage where we are about to sign the transfer of land agreement for the first phase of the riverine corridor land. This means that we will be able to officially/ legally start to maintain the land as we want to. We have plans for various cutting back of vegetation and tree management. Please bear with us as we start this work because everything won't happen over-night. Once the works start and we clear away some of the overgrown hedging and bushes etc., it will be easier to maintain the whole area. We are also in discussion with the district council to take on all the other parts of the riverine corridor.



Tree Works at Kingsash Road and Trebah Square

Soon we will be planting the new trees on Kingsash Road, removing the overgrown trees on Trebah Square and replacing them with new trees more suitable for the space. These trees should not have been planted as they will continue to grow much taller and wider and the roots could cause damage. We are to replace them with a smaller type of silver birch tree which will look good in these areas.

New Road Affecting Aylesbury Vale

Cambridge - Milton Keynes - Oxford Expressway Corridor B announcement

Highways England has announced that Corridor B is its preferred route for the proposed Cambridge - Milton Keynes - Oxford Expressway, following a programme of stakeholder engagement. This is the first of a number of key decisions that will be taken in respect of this locally and nationally important project. The councils will now want to understand more about the government's plan for the county and area to understand the potential implications. The expressway is just one of the components of the government's strategy for the Cambridge - Milton Keynes - Oxford growth corridor and approximately 70% of the new road will pass through Aylesbury Vale. Parish Councils will need to keep an eye on how this proposal will affect our community and local and wider communities will expect Highways England to engage with us in the critical next stage of this project that will be focused on determining the detailed route.

Crime and Anti-social Behaviour

Fairford Leys still remains a low crime area and we want to keep it that way. Unfortunately we, like other communities, are



targeted sometimes and we all need to be vigilant and report matters to the police

Grounds Maintenance Update

The summer baskets have been in full bloom for summer months and we hope you have enjoyed them, we will be taking them down shortly and will be starting our winter planting.

Sadly we are experiencing fly tipping in certain areas, we do our best to remove any unwanted items as quickly as we can, because it seems the longer it stays there the more it is added to; if you see anyone dumping rubbish, please report this to the police and the parish council.

The maintenance of the parks are on-going, all the works reported by ROSPA has been completed, hedges and general works will be continued over the winter months.

We have been strimming and cutting the weeds down as part of our work

on 101. Please remember that unless we report matters, however minor we think they may be, there won't be a profile built up of the types of crime or anti-social behaviour taking place and we are not likely to get the proper assistance we need to deal with these matters. The parish council installed cameras in the main village square and the police have used the evidence from these cameras to successfully identify offenders and also as evidence in court in order to successfully prosecute. Please continue to help us keep our community safe.

Litter

Unfortunately, we still have to deal with large amounts of litter across the village. We clear the main



areas but we do not have the resources to carry out litter picks across the whole village every day. Please help us by putting all litter in the many bins provided or taking it home.

We have a real problem with litter on Coldharbour Way as people throw their litter from their cars onto the highway – many are takeaway food bags and leftover food which also attracts the wildlife for all the wrong reasons. See Cllr Baughan's comments on page 4.

The unusually hot weather created many challenges for both our Grounds Maintenance Team and some parish events. A huge thank you must go to the grounds team for their work in maintaining the planting around our village and, once the weather broke, keeping on top of the inevitable weeds. It is important to remember that these are the people that empty all the bins, both litter and dog waste, in all of our parks, maintain verges and keep our village looking brilliant. They are currently fighting a battle against the amount of litter discarded along Coldharbour Way.

We started the summer with our annual Fair in the Square. This is a well-supported community event and this year was no exception. Adoption of the riverine corridor has been an on-going saga for the past 15 years and pressure has been applied by our County Councillors, District Councillors and Parish Clerk. Despite a last minute change to the contract which, as a parish, we could not accept, there was frantic work behind the scenes to reach the stage where we are adopting the riverine in phases. The first part is ready for transferring and we are pushing for the remainder to be transferred as quickly as possible.

Christmas Tree Festival at the Church on Fairford Leys



I usually have a strict rule not to think about Christmas until the other Autumn activities are completed. We are still (at the time of writing!) enjoying summer-time weather, and thoughts of snow and roaring fires are a long way off. Harvest, Remembrance (100 years since Armistice day) and Advent are important occasions at this time of year, not to be passed over by the all-consuming end of year preparations.

But this year I want to give you plenty of time to think about a rather different festive event. We would like to invite you to the participate in the first ever Fairford Leys Christmas Tree Festival and competition. The aims are to promote local businesses and groups, to raise money for charity, to celebrate Jesus' birthday, and to have some fun!

The idea is that each participant (individual or group) will display a fabulously decorated tree of their choosing in the Church hall and then, during the evening of Christmas in the Square, you will all be asked to vote for your favourite. The winner will then be declared the Christmas Tree champions!

Decorate your tree any way you want (so long as it isn't offensive...), or even go crazy and construct a tree in an alternative way: knit one, weld one, fold one out of paper, 'upcycle' one... The more imaginative the better, and the more it will stick in people's minds when it comes to voting. The trees will then stay up over the remainder of the Christmas season (8th Dec – 5th Jan) so that they can be admired at the Saturday morning coffee sessions, the Christingle, Carol and Christmas services, and of course by all the groups that meet in the building.

There is limited space, so applicants will be accepted on a first come, first served basis, as will positions in the hall on the day they are put up. Trees will not be provided, and artificial or alternative trees are preferred as we can't commit to remembering to water any live ones, sorry! We will not be able to put up or take down trees on your behalf, so a representative of your group must be available to come to the hall on the 8th Dec and 5th Jan. Power may be available if you wish to use lights, but we must be informed in advance so that arrangements can be made. We are asking for an entry fee of £20, all donations will be sent to The Children's Society, the organisation we support each year through our Christingle service. Fairford Leys resident meets the last British Dambuster, George 'Johnny' Johnson

Some of the early residents of Fairford Leys will remember Tony Whittaker, a founder member and Vice Chairman of the Fairford Leys Community Group. In 2001 he was elected Vice Chairman of Coldharbour Parish Council where he served until 2015. What you may not know is that his late father Ivan Whittaker participated in the famous 617 Squadron's epic raid on the Ruhr dams in May 1943. This is Tony's account of an historic occasion; I hope you find it interesting.

On 20th May 2018 I was invited to attend an event honouring the 75th Anniversary of 617 Squadron's epic raid on the Ruhr dams during 16th/17th May 1943, I was fortunate to meet and talk to 'Johnny' Johnson who is one of only two crew members still alive from the original 133 eclectic mix of national's, the other being Fred Sutherland a Canadian, who were tasked to fly on that mission. I am on the left foreground of the photograph taken at the celebration.

My late father, Ivan Whittaker, also participated in that mission, as the Flight Engineer, on board a specially modified Lancaster four engine bomber, AJ-P, P for 'Popsie', piloted by 'Micky' Martin, as crew in one of the first wave of three aircraft to fly very low over the North Sea, the Dutch Coast and hinterland to the German industrial regions and onward to the target area, the Mohne Dam. My father enlisted as an apprentice at RAF Halton, near Wendover, as part of the 37th intake after Lord Trenchard set up the apprentice training scheme in 1922. He spent the first three years of the 2nd World War as groundcrew. As the war intensified, he volunteered for the new aircrew category of 'Flight Engineer'. This came with the advent of four engine heavy bombers such as the Lancaster and he was soon posted to 50 Squadron. He met Flight Lieutenant 'Mickey' Martín, later Air Marshall Sir Harold Martin and after the Dams raid flew with him on some 44 operations, this was a partnership that endured for most of the conflict, during which time he was awarded the DFC and Bar.

During the latter part of 2013 I was invited to apply for the post of Trustee and Treasurer of the Halton Apprentice Association a charity based at RAF Halton, near Wendover and officially became a Trustee for them, later in 2014. In March 2017, I became a Trustee and Treasurer of the Apprentice Association's sister registered charity, the RAF Halton Apprentice's Trust whose aim is to further the legacy created by Lord Trenchard.


In addition on a monthly basis we have the WI and host the monthly parish council meetings.

Exercise to Music • Shape UP & Tone

Keeping fit with Sandra

We all know that we should be exercising on a regular basis as well as looking after our nutrition. We can always find time to eat healthily, but finding time to improve our fitness? with children, young people and adults who have sight loss, hearing loss or dual sensory loss. Our offices are based at Riverside house, Wedgewood Street, Fairford Leys.

A member of our friendly team can visit you at home and complete a specialist assessment, which looks at how your sensory loss affects you day-to-day. We can offer information and advice and small pieces of equipment which can help you stay safe and independent at home. Some examples of this equipment include extra loud/flashing doorbells, smoke alarms with vibrating pads, talking clocks and watches, portable daylight lamps and a range of sticks and canes.

As well as looking at sensory needs, our holistic assessment will pick up any other needs you may have and we will refer you, with your consent, onto more appropriate services which may be able to help.

We offer mobility training for visually impaired children, young people and adults. This is where we can support people with sight loss to learn long cane skills and a number of routes for safe and independent travel. We also offer Sensory Training Awareness for groups and businesses to assist them when dealing with a client who has a sensory loss, please contact us for details. Finally, we register people with



a sight or hearing loss on behalf of Bucks County Council and provide people with a registration card.



Please email the Youth Club email address fairfordleysyc@hotmail. co.uk with your name and your child's name to allow us to keep you informed on any changes or any other relevant information, and also as to your availability to volunteer. **Parents are asked** to volunteer for a maximum of 2 Fridays in any one year to help us maintain our ratios and it is not as scary as you may think!! Please ask us about your role.

Additional forms including confidentiality, members agreed Code of Conduct, and acknowledgement of policy and procedures will also be provided on request.



Feline Friendly Cat Clinic at Watermead

We are very happy to announce our new cat clinic at our Watermead branch, from the 11th September, with our dedicated feline friendly vets.

We offer a dedicated cat only clinic, with no barking dogs, to make vet visits as stress free as possible. We have a separate waiting area for cats, with an area for cats to be placed above floor level, and not able to make eye contact with other cats.

With longer consult times, we find cats have more time to be acclimatised to the vets, and don't have to rush with getting the cat out of the carrier - often after a couple of minutes we find they come out and say hi by themselves. We are also able to offer more services, such as blood taking and blood pressure monitoring.

The cat clinic is ideal for those older felines over 12years of age, more likely to get age related issues (usually being able to identify those earlier can help prolong a happy healthy life), or those first kitten visits, to teach them that the vets isn't a scary place.

Common health issues in older cats:

Kidney disease - is common in cats over 12 years. There are many causes, such as infections, cancers, toxins or attack from their own immune system. This is diagnosed by blood and urine tests. The most common symptom is drinking more, although cats can be discreet, so weight loss is often the first sign, followed by dehydration, poor appetite, to generalised weakness. There is no cure, but treatment is aimed to minimise any symptoms and to slow the rate of the kidneys getting worse. Often if caught early, cats can go on to live a long normal life with minimal changes at home.

Hyperthyroidism – is when the thyroid gland is overactive, and producing too much hormone. This causes the metabolism to speed up, so cats tend to eat plenty but still lose weight. Their heart rate and blood pressure can also go up. It is diagnosed by a simple blood test. It is controlled by medication or surgery.

High blood pressure – is linked to kidney disease and hyperthyroidism. Failing kidneys produce chemicals then constrict the vessel and retain water in the circulation, both increasing blood



pressure. High blood pressure can affect the back of the eye, causing blindness, can worsen kidney disease, and causes the heart to work harder. Medication can be given for high blood pressure, and regular blood pressure monitoring is advised.

Butterflies on Fairford Leys

I am pleased to contribute an article for Coldharbour News, because we have very happy memories of our 15 years in Fairford Leys.

When we moved to Fairford Leys in 2002, I was very impressed by the green spaces, especially the banks of the streams. I have been interested in butterflies since 1949, and I realised that, managed appropriately, these green spaces could become a haven for wildlife generally, and butterflies in particular. I was delighted to get to know Steve Webb, who is also very interested in promoting nature. He allowed me, with enthusiastic practical support, to cultivate a small area on the stream bank near Swallow Lane for wildflowers, and I chose plants which I knew would be attractive to butterflies. This proved to be a great success, and, over the years, I have counted 25 species of butterfly in Fairford Leys. Impressive, as we have 55 species in the whole of the UK!

Many of you have seen me working at this area and have engaged me in conversation, and your interest has been motivating for me. Steve has also been planting interesting wildflowers in different places in FL.

Since we have moved away, Steve Webb has agreed to look after 'my nature reserve', although he is a very busy man, and if any resident would like to take over this not very onerous work, it would be much appreciated.


