Election of Offices

At the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council on 3rd May Councillor Adam Poland was elected as Chairman and Councillor Sally Pattinson re-elected as Vice Chairman. Councillor Cole

We would like to take this opportunity to thank retiring chairman Councillor Andrew Cole for his dedication and commitment over the last 2 years.

Change of Councillors

We were sorry to receive the resignation of Councillor Matthew Wilde in April. Matt has been an active member of the council and together with Cllr Sally-Ann Jarvis was instrumental in the provision of the defibrillator at the Fairford Leys Centre. He also gave regular updates to the council on the results of the MVS signs placed around the village about average vehicle speeds across the community including some quite scary high speeds being registered. The council will continue to monitor this and liaise with the appropriate authorities as and when needed.

At the April Meeting, Councillor Ross Searle was unanimously selected to become a co-opted Parish Councillor, and Councillor Samantha North in May. See details of Ross on page 3. Samantha will follow later.

Mobile Library Service

We are sorry to say that, following a recent public consultation, Buckinghamshire County Council has decided to end the Mobile Library service, with the final visits being due on 31st May 2018. This will obviously include the Mobile Library visits to Hamden Square. Most users will have already been made aware of this decision by the county council.

Cemetery Matters

Did you know that the nearest, largest, cemetery for Fairford Leys is Tring Road Cemetery in Aylesbury? Fairford Leys does not have its own cemetery so residents, should they wish to be buried, would need to use the town cemetery or a nearby village cemetery such as Stone. The prices vary and will be more expensive if you live outside the parish where the cemetery is located.

Tring Road Cemetery was first opened in 1858 after the closure of St Mary's Churchyard for burials. Aylesbury Town Council took over the running of the Cemetery from Aylesbury Vale District Council in 2006. The Town Council maintains the cemetery grounds and has an ongoing improvement plan. This included the building of mausoleums, the installation of Columnbaria and more. For further information please call 01296 425678

The Ernest Cook Trust

You may have noticed frequent references to the Ernest Cook Trust in Coldharbour News particularly in connection with planning applications. However, most people will not be aware of the history of The Ernest Cook Trust and we thought that the following information may be of interest.

History

The Ernest Cook Trust is one of the UK's leading outdoor learning charities. Rooted in the conservation and management of the countryside, the Trust actively encourages children and young people to learn from the land through hands-on outdoor learning opportunities on its estates and by offering grants.

The Trust was founded by the philanthropist Ernest Cook in 1952 and each year, as a result of his foresight and passion for the countryside and the arts, the current Trustees are able to distribute up to \mathfrak{L} 2m in educational grants to benefit children and young people.

The Trust currently owns and manages 22,000 acres of landed estates in Buckinghamshire, Dorset, Gloucestershire, Leicestershire and Oxfordshire: it upholds the highest standards of estate management throughout its land, farms and buildings, remaining true to Ernest Cook's vision.

The Ernest Cook Trust is very unusual in being a land-based trust which has education as its sole charitable object. The Trust places education at its very heart by offering children and young people a range of outdoor learning opportunities.

The Trust's Estates in Buckinghamshire

The Hartwell Estate in the Vale of Aylesbury was purchased by Ernest Cook in 1938 and currently covers some 1,809 acres. The estate is mixed arable and dairy land and is home to two of the Trust's eight dairy farms. The family of one of the farming tenant's has been farming the area for the last 150 years.

Hartwell House is the most celebrated residence on the Trust's estates. With its Elizabethan and Georgian facades and garden landscaped

by Capability Brown it was, for a time between 1807 and 1814, the residence of the exiled future king of France Louis XVIII. Ernest Cook had intended to live on this estate and indeed spent time in the 1930s installing modern heating systems, repairing the roof and the stonework. However, he did not actually take up residence, choosing instead to retire to Bath.

After use of the building as a finishing school and a subsequent serious fire, the leasehold of the house was acquired by Historic Hotels whose owner, Richard Broyd, put huge effort and considerable funds into a programme of restoration. In accordance with Mr Broyd's wishes, the lease was assigned to the National Trust in 2008 but the house continues to be run as one of the UK's top country house hotels.

The estate lies on the southwestern boundary of Aylesbury and over the last few decades has benefited from growth of the town.

Fairford Leys

The Hartwell Estate lies on the eastern edge of the new village of Fairford Leys which was built on land sold by the Trust between 1993 and 2004. The design and management of the development was controlled by the Trust during construction; to ensure community life would be central to the development, facilities such as a community centre, ecumenical church, leisure facilities, shops, offices and a primary school were provided. This has resulted in a vibrant community with a range of accommodation – Fairford Leys is always referred to as an exemplar of sustainable development.

In September the council hosted its annual community event Music in the Square which turned out to be a wonderful evening of music; my thanks to the bands, Dan Blaze and all the

team who work so hard to make the event such a success.

The Remembrance Service held in the church and the square was also well attended; it is so nice to see the many local groups within our community remember those who have given the greatest sacrifice in service of their country. I also attended the Mayor's Remembrance Service in St Mary's Church Aylesbury. This is a wonderful service bringing local communities together.

Christmas in the Square with the addition of the telling of the Nativity was again a wonderful community event and my thanks to the Church on Fairford Leys for putting on a fine show. My thanks also go to the Clerk, the Leisure Committee, the Fairford Leys Centre Staff, the WI and of course, Father Christmas for taking time out of his busy schedule to see so many children.

Riverine Corridor

As you will be aware we continue to push for the hand over of the riverine corridor and this is hopefully approaching completion. As I write we await the land registry completion that

will then allow us to take on phase one of the process. Our maintenance team have been working closely with AVDC and the developers ensuring that the corridor is handed over in an acceptable condition for our team to continue to manage it. Our maintenance team do so much behind the scenes such as gritting some of the roads around the village. grass cutting, emptying dog bins and the setting up and taking down of our village events. We really are very lucky to have such an experienced and dedicated team. So a massive thank you must go to Steve, Gareth and Brian who look after our village so well in all weathers and are so quick to respond when issues are reported.

HS2 remains on the horizon and the parish continues to engage wherever possible to ensure that proper mitigation measures during and after completion will be in place.

The Fairford Leys Centre remains a vibrant hub of the community and is very busy with classes and private hire. They also help out at our community events and my thanks go to them for their hard work in keeping things in check.



The Church of Fairford Leys

"For my house will be called a house of prayer for all nations."

Isaiah 56:7, quoted by Jesus as he stood in the Temple in Jerusalem

Many people will be looking forward at this time of year to a few days away in the summer, or at least a break from their normal routine. I wonder what kind of holiday or adventure you prefer. Are you a sightseer, a lover of culture and architecture, or maybe you're content with as much time on the beach as possible.

This year we have taken an early holiday, as after Easter we had the opportunity to travel with some of our family to Israel. It's a fascinating part of the world, which combines many of the holiday activities I mentioned. The temperature is pleasantly warm at this time of year, and the sea was tempting enough. The area is full of historical and archaeological sites to explore, and Jerusalem is a fascinating mix of cultures, with plenty of opportunities to stop at street cafés and just take in the surroundings.

Many people will visit the area with a sense of pilgrimage, and although we were there on a family holiday, for us that did include visiting some of the major sites mentioned in the Bible. It was interesting to see these towns and areas as they are today, and to try to step back into the world of the Gospel writers. The landscape has not changed much; it was easy to sit on a boat on the Sea of Galilee and, looking towards the far shore, encounter the scene much as Jesus and the disciples did.





The historic sites pose more of a challenge though, as there have been many layers of rebuilding over the years. There seem to be two ways to approach this. For some people the focus is on the exact location and supposed remnants of an event in the life of Jesus. The focus is on being at that precise spot. While it is fascinating to see the general location and imagine the place as it was, for me the power of these memorials is that they mark a location in place and time, the origins of really important events that still affect us today. Whether or not I am looking at the actual building where Jesus was born, I am certainly very close to the spot where this great event took place.

In visiting these ancient sites, we need to appreciate what they say about the past, but more importantly consider the meaning for us here and now. Visiting any church can be just the same: a look back in time, an historical exploration;

or it can be a refreshing and challenging experience for our current day situation. One of the unexpected highlights for me finding a site on Mount of Olives called The Church of the Pater Noster. Associated with teaching the Lord's Prayer to his disciples, it contains wall tiles with the prayer in hundreds of languages and dialects from across the world. My favourite, of course, was the one in Welsh - but then it is the language of heaven!



More seriously, this place reminds us that from this one area the message of God's love has spread all across the world. Wherever you may live, or whatever dark corner you might be in, God's love continues to reach out to you today.



All change for Hospice's Midnight Walk

In 2018, Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity's annual Midnight Walk will change in two important ways.

"We asked the public whether they would like the event to be opened out to men and boys as well as women and girls," explains Jo Turner, Head of Fundraising at Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity (FNHC). "We ran a survey in November and December last year, and 80% of the respondents said they would like men to be allowed to take part."

Responding to the results, the FNHC Events team decided that the 2018 Midnight Walk should be open

to everyone over the age of 11 on the 23rd June.

The Charity also asked survey respondents if they would prefer to keep the distance options the same, or change them to a 5 mile route and a 10 mile route.

"54% of respondents to our research said they would prefer a choice of five miles or ten miles, and so we have decided to trial these distances," says Jo. The new look Midnight Walk will take place on 23 June 2018, starting and finishing at Aylesbury College as usual.

The Midnight Walk is FNHC's largest



fundraising event and last year raised over £55,000 with 475 Walkers dressed in the event's iconic dayglo pink T-shirts and flashing bunny ears. "One thing that won't be changing is the Midnight Walk "uniform"," says Jo Turner. "The flashing ears are spectacular, and the T-shirts in 'Safety Pink' help to keep Walkers visible as well as being traditional!"

My Job by Tim Harper

"John Travolta Is Shiny".

If it comes up in conversation that I work in The Control Tower at Heathrow Airport, it is assumed that I control aircraft. In fact, I am an Air Traffic Systems Engineer and my job is far more interesting!

I work for NATS Ltd. I drive to Heathrow Airport and I walk through Terminal three to a secret passageway that leads to the Control Tower. My office is in the triangular shaped green building at the base of the tower. The Tower was designed to be immediately recognisable to pilots as it brings to mind a fishing float with a central stick and a red tip. (I'm not sure if non-fishing pilots are able to recognise it?) It contains a large heavy, hydraulically operated counterweight inside at the top to reduce movement in high winds.



My office has floor to ceiling, quadruple glazed windows which overlook taxiways, where aircraft silently and constantly glide past. I sit with my colleagues, in front of thirty three video monitors connected to various computer systems used by the controllers in the Visual Control Room, eighty metres above me. It's my own Mission Control, Heathrow! We have a bean to cup coffee machine, which despite having dispensed over 52,000 cups of unrecognisable brown liquid, continues to grind, hiss and splutter with surprising endurance. Luckily, it's a free service!



My job, with my team, is to monitor and respond to problems which the systems may develop. There are around sixty systems used by controllers, which include radio, landing guidance, radar, aircraft ground tracking, weather observation, flight planning and various other support systems, not to mention the World Dynamic Situation Monitor (or Television).

We have a variety of equipment located around the airfield such as weather stations and weirdly shaped landing systems, which have to be routinely inspected and we have to take a special driving test to allow us to drive around the taxiways amongst the moving aircraft. If you find yourself in a plane, on a taxiway, look out the window and you may see our dark blue NATS vehicle driving alongside!

From time to time, we have interesting visitors to The Tower and my favourite was when John Travolta dropped in to visit. With his flying background, he was very interested to see how it's done properly! (He's shorter than I imagined and his face was strangely shiny)

It's exhilarating to watch planes take off and land at close quarters when we're next to the runway. The largest jet engine used on a plane produces about 100,000hp (there's normally two of them) which on take-off, is enough to rattle one's fillings.



We have a strong professional relationship with our Air Traffic Controller colleagues and although we cannot exist without each other, we're happy to make them look good!

Keeping your pet happy and healthy this summer

Despite the UK not being known for its wonderful summers. there are still plenty of things to watch out for, and it is important to keep our animals safe this summer.

Heatstroke

Heatstroke is usually associated with a temperature of over 41C in cats and dogs, when the body fails to cope with external heat, and can lead to multiple organ failure. Dogs with flat faces, those who are overweight and elderly dogs tend not to cope as well with the heat. Dogs can easily overheat when exercising or kept in the sun. Dogs cool themselves down by panting, as they can only sweat a little through their paws. Cats lick themselves instead of sweating, they tend not to pant unless seriously unwell.

Limiting walks to early morning and late evening, when the sun is not strongest can be beneficial. Avoid walking on hot tarmac, which can burn sensitive paws. Fresh water should always be available and an escape from the sun/heat is essential. Signs of heatstroke and dehydration include panting, drooling, lethargy, vomiting and even collapse, and should be seen by a vet.

Sunburn

Sunburn can be common in cats and dogs, especially those with fair skin and thin hair, or if they have been clipped from a recent surgery. Plenty of shade and escape from the sun should be provided. Pet friendly sunscreen should be applied if out in the sun for extended periods, especially on the tips of the ears, nose and belly. Sunburn can be very painful, and even lead to skin cancer.

Fly Strike

Rabbit can also suffer from heatstroke, but the most common problem we tend to see if rabbits in summer is fly strike. This occurs when flies are attracted by faeces, and lay their eggs by the rabbit's anus. These hatch into maggots, which eat the flesh. Daily checking is needed in hot summer months. especially elderly or obese rabbits, who may find it difficult to groom themselves. Rearguard is a useful preventative, which prevents any eggs laid developing, and lasts for 8-10 weeks.

Grass Seeds

Grass seeds are very common in the summer months. The pointy seeds can work their way under the skin, commonly between the toes on their paws. This causes a painful lump, and dogs constantly lick at their paws and can start limping. They can also get into the ears or eyes, and cause a dog to suddenly start shaking their head or closing and rubbing at their eye.

Insect Stings

Most of the time, a single insect sting is just painful and irritating, however multiple stings or being stung in the mouth or throat can be life threatening, as the swelling can block the airway. An allergic reaction, or severe multiple strings, can cause general weakness, difficulty breathing and swelling at the sting site. These need to be treated by a vet as soon as possible.



Young Carers Bucks provide support for young carers aged 6-18 years old in Buckinghamshire Offering: Support & information - 1 to 1 work - trips & activities a chance to meet other young carers - support in schools - young carers clubs.

Some of our young carers have very limited access to social activities because of their caring role, so during schools holidays we can offer some activities and outings. This may be a day doing art, a visit to Wendover Woods, or occasionally further afield like a day at the seaside or a safari park. For older young carers there may be overnight stays and short breaks. We never charge for any of our activities so that all of our young carers have equal access to our services.



We offer regular clubs for young carers in Aylesbury & High Wycombe for three age groups; 6-9, 10-12 and 13+.

These are a fun, social opportunity where young carers can meet up in a safe and relaxed atmosphere, with access to games & computers etc We also run craft and cooking activities and a meal is provided.

There are trained staff and volunteers for the young carers to talk to.

We provide small support groups for young carers who have similar needs.

The groups are an opportunity for young carers to gain more understanding of their caring role and to help them deal with difficult situations. These groups also incorporate fun activities and help to forge friendships.

The support that we offer depends on the needs of the individual and may change throughout their time at Young Carers Bucks.
