





Annual Report of Coldharbour Parish Council April 2019





"I have been lucky enough to be Chairman for the past year. It has been a period of change, success and challenges this past year."

Thanks to Council Staff

Firstly I would like to praise and offer both mine and the council's thanks to both the Fairford Levs Centre manager Andy Barnett and staff and the Grounds Maintenance Manager Steve Webb and staff. I personally feel that the past year has seen a further increase in the quality of their work. The centre is looking better than ever and is a real focus for our community. There have been challenging economic times for the centre but I feel that it has flourished under Andy's management. grounds team continue to make Fairford Leys one of the most attractive places to live in the local area. My favourite time of the year is spring and the daffodil display we are treated to every year.

Chairman's Official Duties

I have been involved in meetings with AVDC concerning both the Wren Path Care Home (alongside Cllr Cole) and taking part in a Workshop regarding the Aylesbury Garden Town initiative (alongside Cllr Pattinson). Over the year I have represented the community at both Fairford Leys Remembrance Service and Christmas in the Square. I have also spoken to and discussed issues with numerous residents, including weed management, footpath maintenance and noise disturbance. We have also now introduced a Facebook page to help improve our communication to our parish. We are now getting regular messages through this channel.

When about, representing Coldharbour Parish Council in the community I often hear and receive comments about how youthful our Parish Council is. Although that is very true, I do tend to correct them. We are a council of doers. We have ideas, we run with them. We occasionally take (sensible) risks for the benefit of our community and none of us are here for the status. We are here to help improve our community.

We have liaised with Thames Valley Police and The Fairford Leys Centre has hosted 2 community marking events which have been well used by the community.

We have had meetings with the HS2 liaisons to our area. This has proved interesting and will continue to be a challenge over the next few years to ensure minimal disruption to our residents.

Community Events

As a council we have organised and enjoyed many community events. Fair in the Square was another success, despite the Semi-Final of the World Cup which did affect numbers. Music in the Square was another well attended event. The work by the leisure committee to make these events self-sustaining is to be commended. Our Remembrance Sunday service was incredibly moving and very well attended and the arrival of Father Christmas to the village is always a sight to remember.

The Leisure Committee has made great strides in making our community events self-sustaining and increasing the activities on offer. This is down to the dedication of those committee members and the council as a whole. It is also worth noting the closure of the Youth Club and subsequent disbanding of the Youth Services committee, whose responsibilities have now been taken over by the Leisure Committee. Preparations for Fair in the Square are progressing nicely and Music in the Square has been taken in house (with thanks to Cllr Cole) and looks set to be another great evening.

Land Transfer

I was very pleased to sign the land transfer documents for the Riverine Corridor last month (although I feel I was standing on the shoulders of giants who

have done the hard work over the last 15 years) to finally get the land handed over to our council. I am sure we all agree on the rapid improvements the grounds team have made already.

Thankyous

One of the great things of being Chairman is being a member of all committees and seeing the decisions made. Personal and community thanks need to go to Cllr David and his Finance Committee, who, over the past few years have dealt with falling income from local government, price rises and inflation and managed to create a budget to make Coldharbour Parish financially sound for many years to come.

I would like to thank our District and County Councillors, Cllr Cole, Cllr Lambert and Cllr Jarvis for all their sterling work representing our community at District and County Level. For keeping us informed of developments that may have an effect on us at a local government level, and for their behind the scenes work in helping accomplish the land transfer for the Riverine Corridor.

No annual statement is complete without a word about our Clerk. We are incredibly lucky to have Keith working diligently and passionately for our community. This past year has shown to me just how much he actually does, both what is visible to the council and what happens behind the scenes. Also, the help, guidance and sense of humour he has shown this new Chairman has been very much personally appreciated.

Lastly, I would like to thank you, the parish council. On a personal note, this year has been one of unexpected change (in a great way). Thank you for all your support and kind words during our pregnancy and since the arrival of Baby Evan. Since his arrival, although lacking sleep, I understand even more the value of community. As a parish council we are the drivers of our community. It could not be in better hands for the future.

Bucks County Council News

The following is an extract from the Annual Report to Coldharbour Parish Council – April 2019 by County Councillor Steven Lambert

Unitary Authority

The Secretary of State had made a 'minded to' decision on the future of the County and District Councils, setting out a plan for a single Buckinghamshire-wide council. This week the Secretary of State laid the Structural Change Orders to formally make this happen.

This is the second piece of legislation required to implement the new unitary council for Buckinghamshire and follows on from the Regulations that were agreed earlier this year.

The Structural Changes Order details how the change to the new council will take place and how it will be set-up. The draft Order will be considered and debated by both Houses of Parliament.

No changes of any significance have been made since the original draft. The Order confirms the following details:

- The name of the new council will be 'Buckinghamshire Council' and it will have 147 councillors.
- Elections for the new council will take place in May 2020.
- A temporary Shadow Authority will be formed, with all current county and district councillors having a seat on this body; the shadow authority will set the 2020/21 council tax and budget.
- Leadership will be provided by a 17 seat Shadow Executive with eight District nominees and eight County

Council nominees, plus the Leader of the County Council as its Chairman unless the Executive votes otherwise.

 An implementation team, led by the County Council Chief Executive and with a district Chief Executive as deputy, should be established to manage the smooth transfer of services and staff to the new Council

It is expected that the Order will take around 6 to 8 weeks to progress through Parliament. Once it is approved the Shadow Authority then needs to meet within 14 days. With just one year to go, some real and effective progress in bringing together the more than 1000 work-streams across all five authorities is properly underway.

HS2

Preparatory works I commences by HS2 representatives up and down the line. Unlike our Member of Parliament I have maintain my strong opposition to this major project which does not benefit Aylesbury in any way, but leaves a poorly mitigated scar across our green and open space and comes within a few hundred meters of Fairford Leys. I have continued to help a number of residents with questions and issues arising from the scheme

Changes to 'The Dump' (Household Recycling Centres including Rabans Lane)

The County Council cabinet have made reductions to the opening times of the Rabans Lane Recycling Centre from 1st April 2019 and have introduced charges for certain items taken there by residents. The Rabans Lane 'dump' will no longer be open on Wednesdays and Thursdays, though the Aston Clinton site will remain open 7 days a week.

From 1 April 2019 residents are charged for disposing of non-household waste items such as, bags of rubble, kitchen units, fence panels etc. Before unloading your waste, you will have to see a member of site staff who will work out how much you need to pay. Payments will be accepted via credit, debit, or pre-paid payment card only. Cash payments will not be accepted.

Grounds Maintenance update - Riverine corridor

the whole adoption process will be

complete.

Back in 2001 when the Coldharbour Parish Council (CPC) came into being it was always their goal to adopt the riverine corridor and all of the green spaces in Fairford Levs. This had the advantage that they could look after it with their own staff and maintain it for all of the residents. Over the last few years the Parish Council has been working closely with the developers and AVDC to get the riverine corridors into a more manageable condition before the adoption process would be completed.

The first phase has been handed over to CPC and the team have been managing the first stretch from Bright Start Nursery down to Chelsea Road for the last six months. You may still see the developer's contractors working on the site from time to time as they are completing the next six phases before The kind of work the team have been carrying out include removal of damaged and deceased trees, cutting

back of footpaths and bridges and general maintenance including litter clearance and grass cutting. Whilst to some residents the initial work may seem a little harsh it all forms part of an overall strategy and programme of works, which in the long run will benefit both the residents and the wildlife.

I would like to assure all residents that we only take out trees and bushes which have been carefully assessed by an independent tree surgeon and myself as I am also a qualified tree surgeon, before any works are carried out by the contractors or the CPC team. I am happy to answer any questions you may have.



We have received some lovely comments from residents who have noted the return of some wildlife and flowers and who are grateful for the hard work the team are doing to keep Fairford Levs looking lovely.

We will keep you informed about the progress of the riverine corridor adoption in future issues of Coldharbour News and if you have any questions in the meantime please contact CPC or attend the monthly council meeting.


My wife, Julie, and I moved to Andrews Way Fairford Leys in 1999, our two children have grown up here both attending St Mary's school, they are now teenagers.

"This fiftieth year will be a jubilee for you." Leviticus 25:11

Looking forward to the summer prompts many people to think of their holiday plans. Perhaps you've had this all sorted since Christmas or even earlier; or maybe you like to wait and see what last minute deals are offered. Even if it's just a short break in this country, or simply a few days at home, rest and relaxation are vitally important.

It can sometimes seem selfish to take time for ourselves and our families. There is an endless list of tasks to be done; we are called on, at all hours and in various ways, to respond to the demands of others. But remember what the safety briefings always tell us - put on your own oxygen mask or lifejacket first, before you attempt to help others. We need to take care of ourselves if we are to be the best we can for others. This principle is well established in the Bible. After the work of creation God rested on the seventh day, giving us the principle of Sabbath rest. Even if circumstances mean that Sunday is occupied for you, a day apart from our regular activities is important for all of us.

The Bible goes even further than this. God's creation is not just about humanity, but the whole natural world. enjoy freely. And it doesn't stop there. After a "Sabbath of Sabbaths", meaning seven cycles of seven years, there was a special arrangement called the Jubilee, in the 50th year. In this special year, God gave abundant blessings, in order to release the people from hard work. Also, debts were cancelled, slaves and prisoners would be freed, people returned to be with their families, and land was returned to its original owners. Harmony and balance were restored to creation.

This may not be the 50th year, but as we mark this 50th edition of Coldharbour News, let's give thanks for this community and all who serve us in this place. Let's do what we can to ensure a balanced and harmonious use of our time and resources, ensuring that no-one goes without and no-one is unfairly treated. Enjoy your holiday, whatever it might look like, and seek that rest you need and deserve.



Neighbourhood Watch

I am Rio, the Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator for Fairford Leys and I would like to tell you how to become a Co-ordinator in your area. It's easy to set up and it is making something that we already do in a more official capacity.

This helps to bring everyone together in a neighbourly way and is also a good deterrent to opportunistic thieves who will be discouraged by community NHW schemes. In our scheme we have an "All Eyes Email Alert" when a member is planning to go away.

In other villages it works well to have a village coordinator who liaises with a network of street co-ordinators, who each have a small patch to look after. Meetings can be face to face or virtually on Facebook and emails.

I am here to help if you would like to start a NHW Scheme on your street/close/road. For details please contact me on riogrr@googlemail.com I am DBR checked and all information is held in confidence. Those creating or joining a scheme will be required to complete a NHW Data Protection Consent Form.



At this time we are promoting "Friends Against Scams". The aim is to help residents be aware of how scams work and how to prevent you from becoming a victim of Scams.

Public Footpaths

Keep your dog on a lead and be careful when entering fields with livestock.

We have had reports of serious attacks on sheep on land which have public footpaths running through them. Whilst the public are allowed to walk these footpaths you must keep a dog on a lead if there is livestock in the field. Also be aware, that cattle and sheep may be inquisitive or will protect their young and you could find yourself in a difficult situation if confronted by cattle afraid of a dog.

Farmers are legally entitled to shoot dogs if they are endangering their sheep/livestock.

Staying legal in England and Wales

It is an offence to allow a dog to worry sheep.

Under the **Dogs** (**Protection** of **Livestock**) **Act 1953**, if a dog worries sheep on agricultural land, the person in charge of the dog is guilty of an offence.

The Act considers sheep worrying to

include attacking sheep, chasing them in a way that may cause injury, suffering, abortion or loss of produce or being at large (not on a lead or otherwise under close control) in a field or enclosure in which there are sheep.

It is every dog's instinct to chase, even if they are usually obedient and good with other animals. Chasing by dogs can do serious damage to sheep, even if the dog doesn't catch them. The stress of worrying by dogs can cause sheep to die and pregnant ewes to miscarry their lambs. Sheep fleeing from dogs are often killed or seriously injured by panicked attempts to escape, causing untold damage to fences and field boundaries in the process. Dogs chasing ewes and lambs can cause mis-mothering issues, with lambs dying from starvation or hypothermia when they become separated from their mother and fail to find her again.

Dog bites can cause death in sheep or necessitate them being put down at a later date, or in less severe cases



considerable veterinary bills and additional welfare issues as a result of flies being attracted to the blood and leading to a nasty health problem in sheep called 'fly strike'. Injuries to sheep can also delay the normal farming routine, be it the mating season or administration of vital medicines and vaccines.

It is vital that you keep your dog on the lead around livestock, even if you can usually trust it to come to call.

If you live in or near a farming area, you must make sure that your dog cannot escape from your property, as it may find its way onto land containing sheep/livestock.


